In the late 1500s, the Dublin administration complained that Galway citizens are 'in heart wholly Spanish'.

Finds from excavations in the town, indicate that transit trade with other Irish and English ports whereby French merchandise arrived into Galway was brisk until the 1550s when it seems Iberia became the main trading partner for the Galway merchants and Gaelic lords.
